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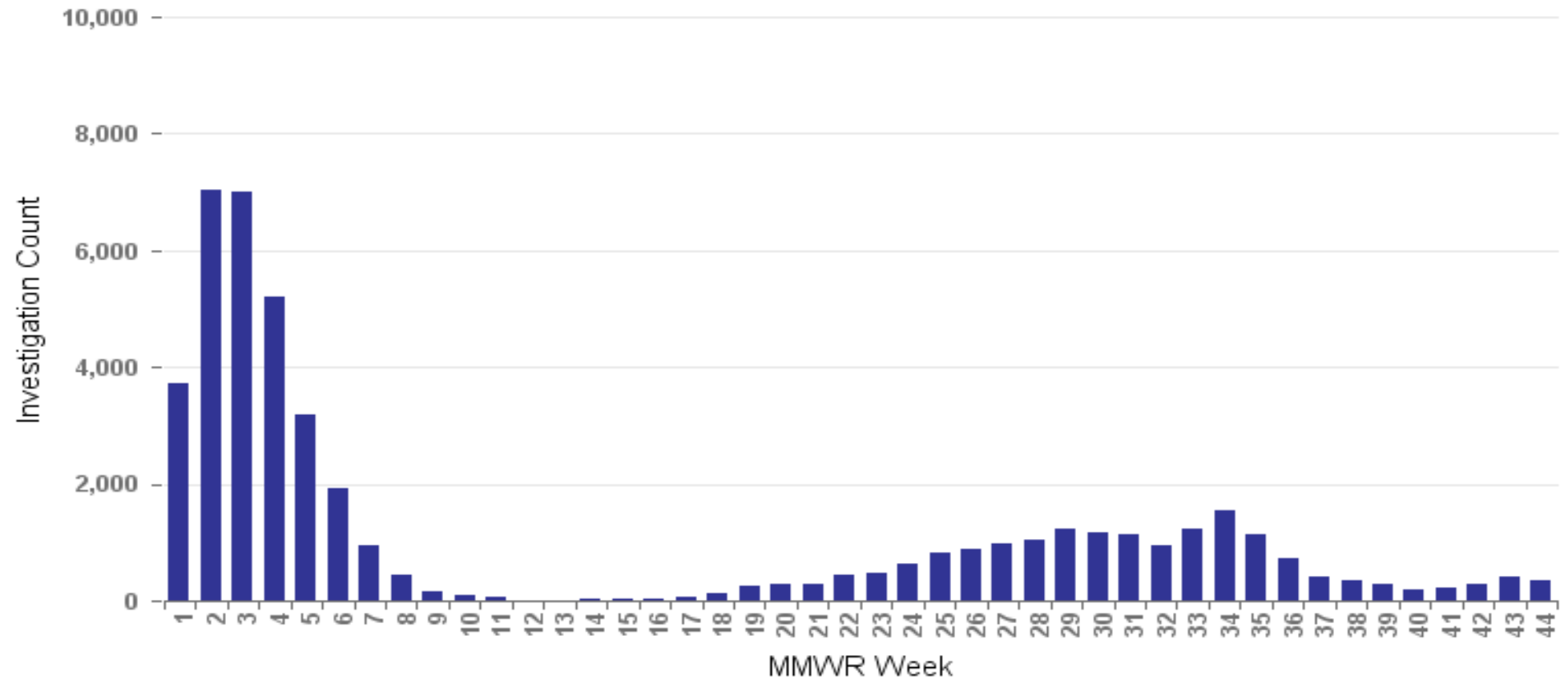

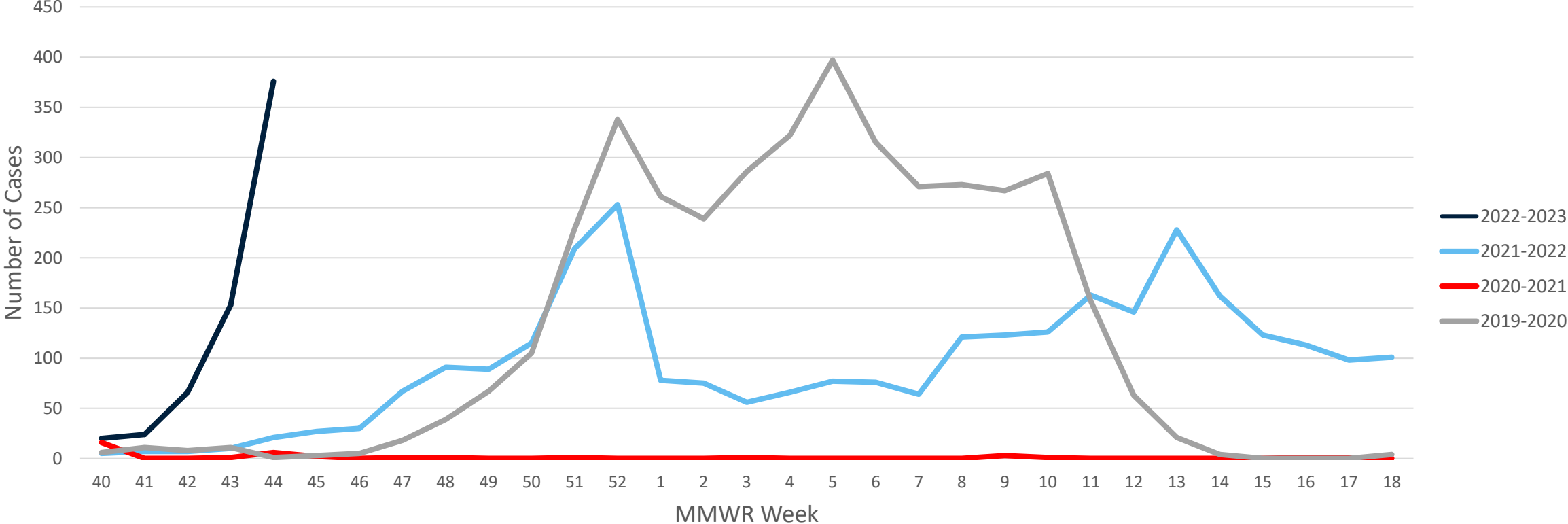
2022 Weekly COVID-19 Cases

Barren River Region 2022 Weekly COVID Cases



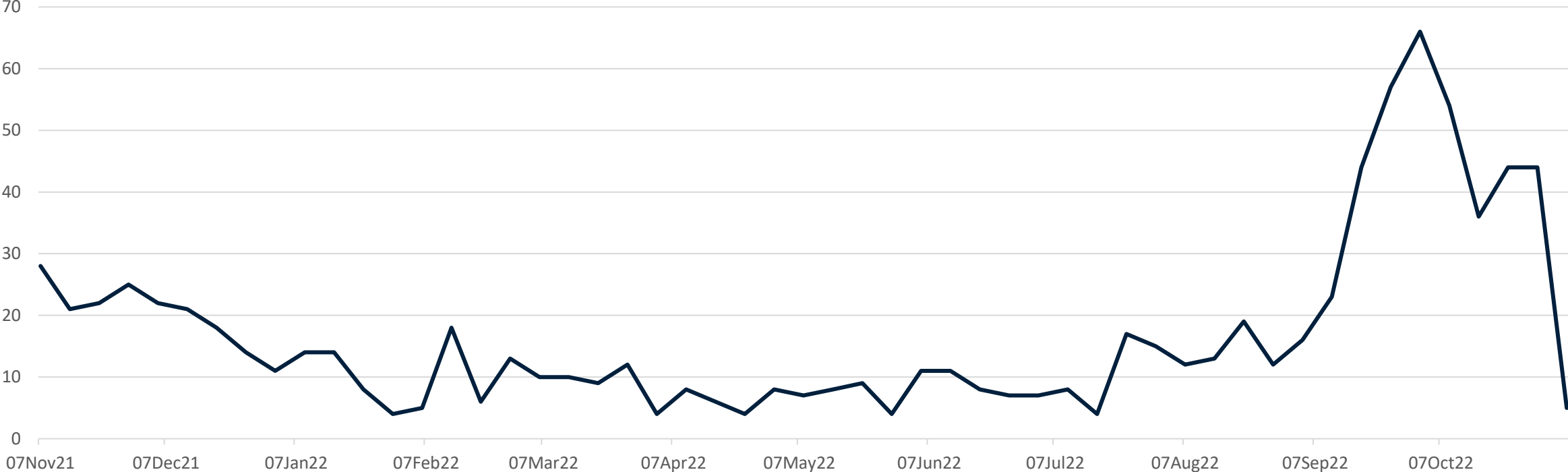

Confirmed Flu Cases for 2019-2022 Flu Seasons



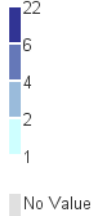
